Community input is critical

For over a decade Noyo Headlands Unified Design Group has been vigilant in monitoring the painstakingly slow cleanup of the Georgia-Pacific mill site in Fort Bragg. Closed in 2002, the cleanup process should have been faster and far more transparent. Our community has been very patient. After many delays DTSC - The California Department of Toxic Substances Control was brought in to move the process forward. Cleanup of the site is entering its final phase with the cleanup of Operable Unit-E. DTSC has just sent out an announcement of a very important meeting on April 21 at 6:30 p.m. in Town Hall, Fort Bragg. NHUDG is concerned that the cleanup of OU-E is not being addressed in its entirety. The community meeting on Thursday, April 21st will speak to removal of toxins from part of this critical wetland area while putting the cleanup of the largest of the mill ponds, pond # 8 on hold. The rationale for separating cleanup of OU-E into two phases is to move more quickly on completing the Coastal Trail. This is understandable. We are all anxious to connect the northern and southern parts of the trail. There may be a problem with this approach, however. Everyone in Fort Bragg knows the Mill Pond needs a thorough cleanup. This must be addressed now, before we encircle the Mill Pond with a wildly popular trail that makes the Mill Pond clean-up more difficult. Furthermore, the cleanup and removal of Pond 8 is essential to the daylighting of Maple Creek and restoration of the natural wetlands on the mill site. We have a unique opportunity to build on the success of the Coastal Trail and restore the extensive wetlands that remain on the former mill site. Restored wetlands, The Noyo Center and the Coastal Trail will create a magnet for future prosperity and a compelling model of a sustainable future. Please come: Thursday, April 21 6:30, Town Hall.

Dear Senator Leno,

(Organization) supports giving communities better options to elect majority winners in local elections. Voters deserve options to avoid the problems of vote splitting and spoiler effects. The State of California should not limit voters to first-past-the-post voting, which can penalize a group of like-minded voters by vote splitting when there are a few more candidates seeking their votes.

Local jurisdictions should have access to the same solutions that charter cities are already successfully using: traditional runoff elections and ranked choice voting. Local jurisdictions should be able to choose, with voter approval, one of these methods for conducting fair elections that best match local circumstances.

California Senate Bill SB1288, Local Options for Elections, is important to Mendocino County as it expands local control of local elections. If SB1288 passes, general law cities and counties could choose to switch city, county, or school board elections to ranked voting, also known as instant runoff, single transferable vote and ranked choice voting. SB1288 specifies ranked voting procedures for both single-winner and multi-winner elections such as city councils and school boards. Even if Mendocino County approves a charter that allows ranked voting, SB1288 is still important locally as other counties choosing to adopt ranked voting might improve accessibility of suitable voting machines, voter education, and election worker training.

In 2009, a similar bill, AB1121, passed the assembly and senate mostly along party lines but was vetoed by then governor Schwarzenegger. The Ukiah City Council endorsed AB1121 and the Ft. 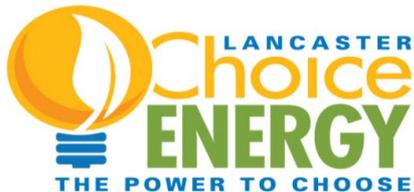

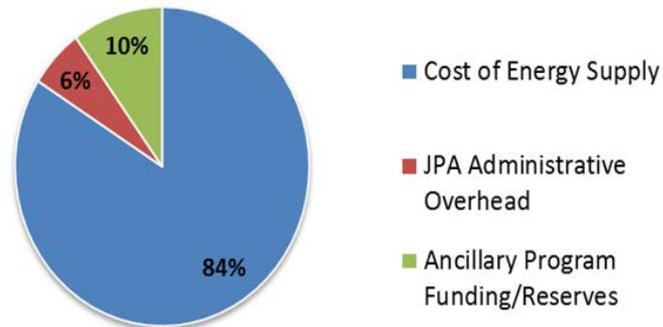

How Does it Work?

1. *FORM or JOIN a Joint Powers Agency* in which participating local governments pass an ordinance and enter into a JPA Agreement, or outsource the program.
2. *Utility (PG&E) continues to provide* consolidated billing, customer service, grid and line maintenance without service interruption.
3. *PG&E programs for low income/CARE* customers remain the same.
4. *CCE electric generation charges* (including exit fee) appear as new line items on the customer bill; all other charges remain the same.
5. *CCE becomes default electric provider*, as customers are automatically enrolled and receive *at least 4 opt-out* notices over 120 days and *can return to PG&E service any time*.
6. *CPUC certifies CCE Plan*, oversees utility/ CCE service agreement and other requirements.

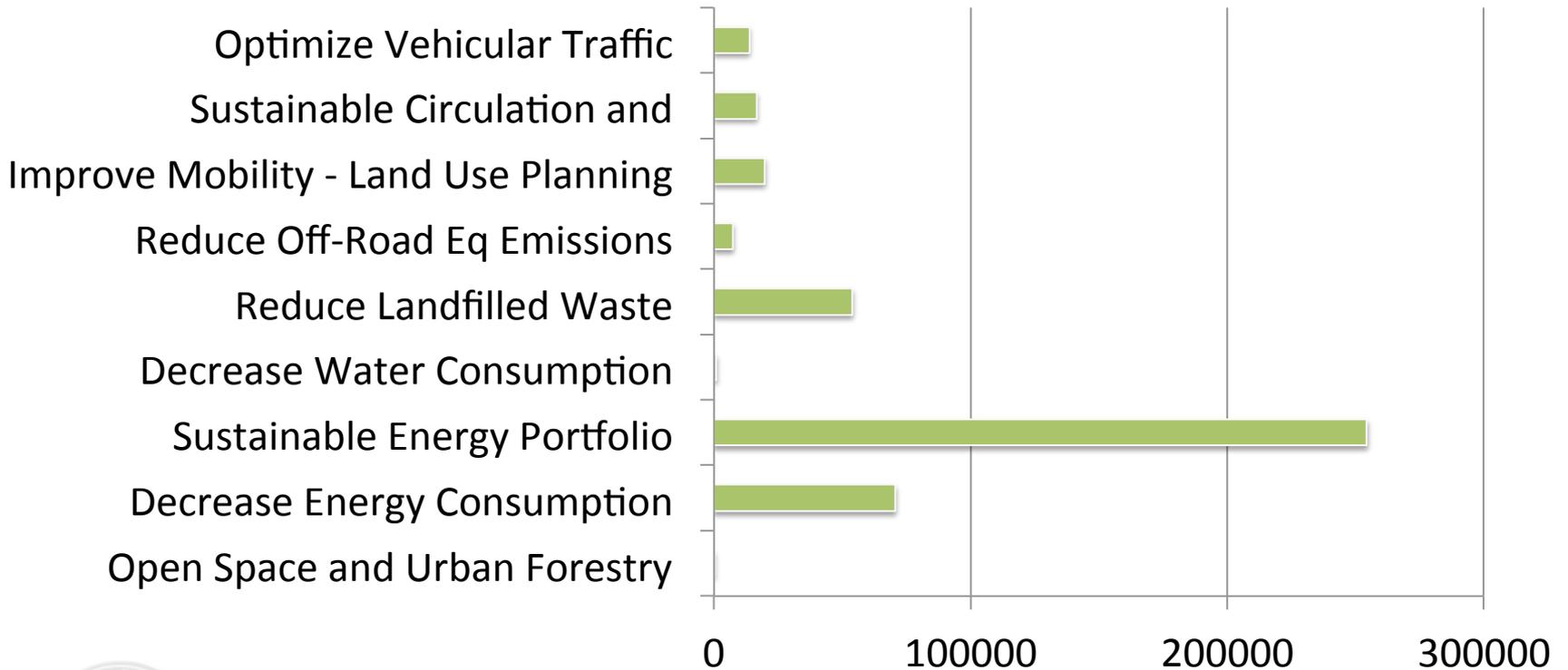

Local CCE Program Options

CCE encourages new energy programs

- MCE and SCP have collectively added over 300MWs of new renewable power to the grid; nearly 100 MW is local power
- Local Feed-in-Tariff, Net Energy Metering programs incentivize local DG
- Public/Private Partnerships: Community solar, commercial and residential battery storage, home area networks/demand reduction, EV charging stations
- Energy efficiency funding from utility and state
- On-bill repayment option and green business loans
- Local job training programs that focus on underserved populations



Risks & Mitigations

Rate Competition/Market Fluctuation:

Rates will vary with market conditions. Power market is currently favorable but power market expertise and well crafted energy contracts are essential; diversified supply portfolio and “value add” programs.

Customer Opt-Out:

Competitive rates are a must; articulate additional community benefits. Opt-out rates typically range from 5%-15%.

Political:

Align CCE to local policy objectives; appeal to both progressive and conservative minds by making the environmental AND business case.

Regulatory/Legislative:

State legislation and CPUC decisions can adversely affect CCE; join a growing group of CCEs and advocacy organizations by participating in the state regulatory and legislative process.

Program Options & Next Steps

What options are being considered by the County?

- Join an existing CCE program (such as Sonoma Clean Power)
- Form a stand-alone CCE program that includes the county and interested cities
 - Option A: Outsource program funding and operations (similar to Humboldt County)
 - Option B: Form a new JPA that is locally funded and operated (similar to San Mateo County)
- Consider an operational partnership with City of Ukiah Electric Utility

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS ABOUT COMMUNITY CHOICE ENERGY

What is CCE?

Community Choice Energy (CCE)* is a municipal program that buys electricity for local residents and businesses. Its goal is to purchase power with higher renewable and lower carbon content than is currently available. It also strives to offer competitive rates and reinvest in local energy infrastructure.

There are currently three CCEs operating in California. Each of them provides greener power at lower costs to the ratepayers in their communities.

**MCE Clean Energy
Sonoma Clean Power
Lancaster Choice Energy**

**Also known as CCA or Community Choice Aggregation*

How will it work?

If Mendocino County forms a CCE, it will purchase electricity on your behalf, from sources that are cleaner, greener and more local. This will offer you a range of energy choices for the first time.

Formation of a CCE won't interrupt your service in any way—it will remain just as it's always been. PG&E will continue to deliver the electricity from the grid to your house or business, maintain the power lines, read your meter, and send you a single consolidated bill. The only change will be an opportunity to choose between different energy options.

The goal of a CCE is to offer electricity options with higher renewable energy content than PG&E's standard offering while retaining competitive prices, thus reducing our reliance on fossil fuels and minimizing greenhouse gas emissions. If your home or business is in a CCE service area, you will be automatically enrolled in the program. You can choose to opt out and return to PG&E bundled service at any time.

What's being done?

On July 13, 2015, the City Council approved a contract with WRA Environmental Consultants of San Rafael ("WRA") to complete a feasibility study and conceptual design for the "City Surrounded by a Trail" project (subsequently renamed "City of Trails" project). At a special City Council workshop regarding the City of Trails feasibility study, Council directed staff to make the Noyo Harbor/Fort Bragg Coastal Trail Connection a high priority. The proposed contract amendment includes changes to the scope of work to include the addition of North Harbor Drive and the Access Road from the Dredge Sands site to the Coastal Trail to the feasibility study and to complete conceptual design and engineering of these potential pedestrian and bicycle improvements. The additional services required of WRA and its subcontractor, Questa Engineering, are outlined in Exhibit A to the proposed First Amendment to Professional Services Agreement attached hereto. Costs associated with this increase in scope of work total \$34,468 (see page 6 of Exhibit A). This amount is more than adequately covered by a Mendocino Council of Governments (MCOG) Transportation Planning Work Program Grant set aside for the Noyo Harbor Access Plan, which has a total budget of \$55,770. The Term of the Agreement and Time of Completion are being extended by three months to allow time to complete the extra services.

RESOLUTION OF THE FORT BRAGG CITY COUNCIL APPROVING A FIRST AMENDMENT TO A PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT WITH WRA ENVIRONMENTAL CONSULTANTS FOR “CITY OF TRAILS” CONCEPTUAL DESIGN AND FEASIBILITY PROJECT AND AUTHORIZING CITY MANAGER TO EXECUTE SAME (AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$34,468, ACCOUNT NO. 314-3020-0630)

WHEREAS, a Request for Proposals (RFP) was issued in January 2015 for consulting services to complete a feasibility study and conceptual design for the “City Surrounded by a Trail” Project (renamed “City of Trails”) and of the four qualified proposals received, WRA Environmental Consultants of San Rafael was determined to be the most qualified firm; and

WHEREAS, on July 13, 2015, the City Council approved a contract for \$65,500 with WRA Environmental Consultants to provide professional services for a conceptual design and feasibility study for the “City of Trails” Project; and

WHEREAS, on October 29, 2015, the Fort Bragg City Council emphasized the importance of providing a connection to the Noyo Harbor, either via North Harbor Drive or via the old access road from the Dredge Sands Site to the Coastal Trail; and

WHEREAS, in 2015 the City was awarded \$55,770 in MCOG funding for the Noyo Harbor Access Plan to study the engineering feasibility of establishing safe pedestrian and bicycle access to the Noyo Harbor from North Harbor Drive and the access road that runs from the Dredge Sands site to the Coastal Trail; and

WHEREAS, due to the overlap in the scope of the City of Trails and the Noyo Harbor Access Plan, the City determined that it would be most efficient and effective to have these studies completed by the same consultant, WRA and their sub-consultant Questa Engineering; and

WHEREAS, due to the consequential increase in the scope of the Project, additional design and engineering services are needed, as described in the revised Scope of Work of the First Amendment attached hereto as Exhibit A; and

WHEREAS, a proposal dated February 22, 2016, was provided to the City by WRA Environmental Consultants and sub-consultant Questa Engineering for additional services in an amount not to exceed \$34,468; and

WHEREAS, the cost for the additional services will be covered by a Mendocino Council of Governments (MCOG) Transportation Planning Work Program Grant for the Noyo Harbor Access Plan, which has a budget of \$55,770; and

WHEREAS, based on all the evidence presented, the City Council finds as follows:

1. WRA Environmental Consultants is currently providing conceptual design and engineering services for this project.
2. The Project time of completion has been extended due to the addition of engineering analysis for the North Harbor Drive access and access road from the Dredge Sands site to the Coastal Trail.

3. WRA Environmental Consultants will be paid based upon the Budget for additional costs in their proposal dated February 22, 2016 in an amount not to exceed \$34,468.
4. Adequate funding is available from the MCOG Grant for Noyo Harbor Access Plan to complete the work as provided in the amendment proposal.

WHEREAS, CITY and CONSULTANT entered into an Agreement on July 13, 2015 for professional services from CONSULTANT to prepare a conceptual design and feasibility study for the "City Surrounded by a Trail" project; and

WHEREAS, on October 29, 2015, the Fort Bragg City Council authorized changes in the scope of work to include modified approaches to supporting the public workshops and additional concepts for design development; and

WHEREAS, The City was awarded Mendocino Council of Governments (MCOG) funding to complete an engineering study of access to North harbor Drive, known as the North Harbor Access Plan; and

WHEREAS, WRA has submitted a proposal to subcontract the required engineering services for the North Harbor Access Plan to Questa Engineering; and

WHEREAS, WRA has been performing tasks for the City Surrounded by a Trail (AKA City of Trails) project which is ongoing and the proposed engineering work by Questa Engineering is interconnected with this ongoing work underway by WRA; and

PURPOSE

The purpose of this Change Order #3 is to describe the services and costs for WRA, in cooperation with Questa Engineering, to provide additional engineering and planning for North Harbor Drive and Old Mill Road in Fort Bragg, California. WRA will incorporate the findings of these additional engineering and planning investigations into the City of Trails Feasibility Study started under the original contract and modified in subsequent revisions dated July 13 and October 12, 2015 respectively.

WRA is in the process of preparing the City of Trails Feasibility Study which, as a result of the Community Workshop and subsequent City Council decision on October 29th, 2015 focuses on three trail connections;

- Redwood Avenue Coastal Trail Connection to Downtown,
- Old Mill Road connecting the Coastal Trail to North Noyo Bay, and
- South Noyo Harbor Trail.

The City of Fort Bragg recognizes the north side of Noyo Harbor as a major destination and economic driver in the Fort Bragg community. This important business, tourism and recreation destination has no sidewalk access for pedestrians or bicycle access along the very constrained North Harbor Drive roadway. Providing a dedicated pedestrian and bicycle access along North Harbor Drive will dramatically enhance safe passage, especially for bicyclists, to the harbor from the City for tourists and residents. Numerous engineering constraints, such as a narrow right of way and steep down-slopes will require preliminary geotechnical evaluations and consideration of advanced engineering alternatives by Questa Engineering to accommodate the extra width required for a trail next to North Harbor Drive.

A preliminary planning study for Old Mill Road has revealed the need for additional engineering on the

berm around the dredge spoils pond and at a specific eroded site along the road. This change order will provide an engineering assessment of the berm and the eroded area.

The existing pedestrian only access to the Harbor is a very steep, unmaintained and privately-owned trail through the Harbor Lite Lodge property. Improvements to the Harbor Lite Lodge Trail will be recommended, but will not be developed to the same level as the other trails since it is already an existing trail.

SCOPE OF WORK

This change order adds one additional trail into the final City of Trails Feasibility Study along North Harbor Drive and provides additional engineering for the proposed trail on Old Mill Road. The tasks described below utilize alphabetic suffices on the original task numbers and this funding request is organized to augment the existing tasks and funding structure. Table 1 at the end of this section summarizes the budget for this change order request. The engineering studies will be incorporated into the final City of Trails Feasibility Study.

Task 1A – Field Reconnaissance

A Questa staff Geologist and Engineer will visit the two trail sites to evaluate field conditions and report on the need for special structures.

Task 1B – Project Management

WRA will continue to provide the primary point of contact for the City of Fort Bragg and will coordinate deliverables, communications and financing between all members of the design team and the City.

Task 2A – Stakeholder Meeting

WRA will attend a City sponsored stakeholder meeting to discuss potential alternatives for the proposed trail on North Harbor Drive. WRA will provide available documentation including the base maps described below and will support the City in facilitating the stakeholder meeting.

Deliverable - WRA will work with the City to conduct a meeting with stakeholders to identify preferred design alternatives and potential conditions for approval. While in Fort Bragg, WRA will also conduct a site visit to all the proposed trail sites to confirm design approaches.

Task 3A – Develop Engineering Base Maps

Questa utilize LiDAR topographic data and convert it into AutoCAD and DEM compatible files for engineering use. Built features will be taken from aerial photography, interpretation of LiDAR and ground observations. Preliminary property lines will be taken from City GIS shape files, any readily available Caltrans right of way maps, and record drawings or improvement plans on file with the City.

Deliverable: Two Topographic Base Maps, one for each Study area, 1"= 40', 1-2 foot contour intervals.

Task 3B – Complete Engineering Analysis

Old Haul Road. Based on an analysis of preliminary trail plans and topographic maps from the task above, a complete engineering analysis and constructability review of conversion of the Old Haul Road to a public access trail will be completed. The review will focus on a) the berm on the west of the dredge spoils pond, b) the alternative alignment on the east side of the dredge spoils pond, and c) the eroded area about half way up the trail towards the upper bluff. Grading, cut and fill sources, and volumes and stability of the trail prism will be evaluated.

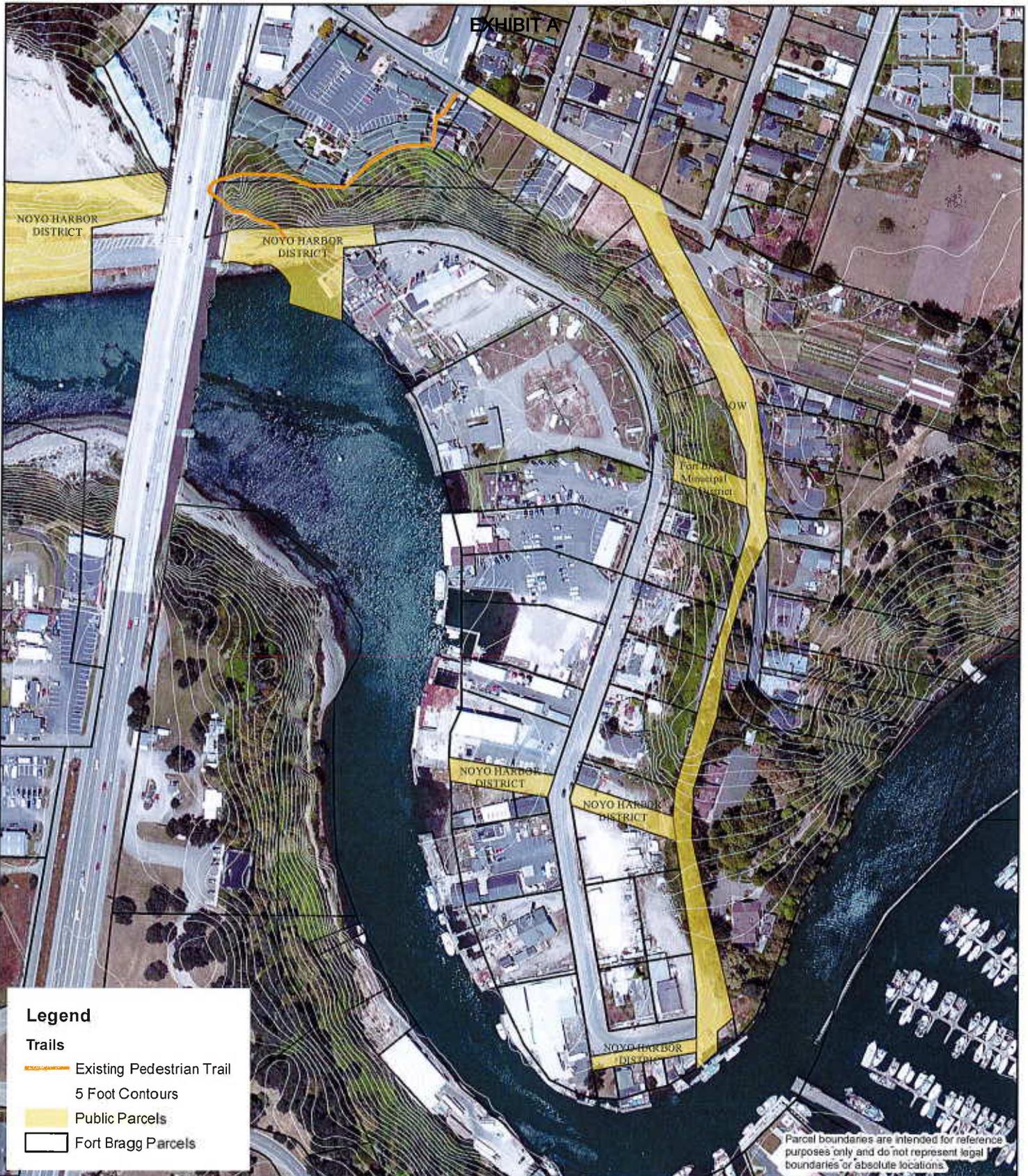


Figure 1. Harbor Drive Trail Concept

North Harbor Drive. The analysis will include a conceptual plan and profile, and at least four scaled cross sections depicting possible approaches to constructing a trail structure on the Harbor Drive road shoulder slope, as shown in Figure 1, using techniques such as a soldier pile retaining wall or a cantilevered walkway structure.

Deliverable - Preliminary Engineering Designs for each trail, including trail plan, profile, cross sections and conceptual structure details of portions of Old Haul Road and North Harbor Drive.

Task 3C – Preliminary Geotechnical Evaluation Report

A brief, initial geotechnical report will be completed in this task, summarizing the results of the field evaluation, a review of available geologic, geomorphic and landslide mapping, and other geotechnical information from nearby areas provided by the City. The report will summarize constraints, contain preliminary design recommendations, and outline next steps and additional studies needed.

Deliverable - Preliminary Geotechnical Evaluation based on site reconnaissance and available information review; includes discussion of constraints and preliminary design recommendations.

Task 3D – Preliminary Cost Estimates

Preliminary cost estimates for the two study areas will be prepared including final design, engineering costs, environmental review and permitting, construction, and construction management and any ROW engineering costs. Additional easements will also be required and the City of Fort Bragg will be responsible for any negotiations or discussions with landowners. Right of Way acquisition costs will not be included.

Deliverable - Preliminary Final Design and Construction Cost Estimates of Old Haul Road and North Noyo Drive trail segments.

Task 4A – Draft City of Trails Feasibility Study

WRA will consolidate the engineering and planning information for North Harbor Drive and Old Mill Road into the Draft City of Trails Feasibility Study and will respond to comments regarding the draft in conjunction with the overall study. The draft report will follow the template approved for the City of Trails Feasibility Study as follows.

Task 5A – Final City of Trails Feasibility Report

WRA will provide responses to City comments on the draft and provide a final print check copy of the City of Trails Feasibility Study for the City to confirm final changes. WRA will provide 5 copies of the finished report to the City and will also forward all electronic files used to produce the study.

Deliverable: One electronic copy of the Final City of Trails Feasibility Study and all electronic files used to produce the City of Trails Feasibility Study.

STAFFING

Paul Curfman will continue to be the Project Manager and George Slavaggio of WRA will be the Principal-in-Charge. WRA will continue to provide design and technical staff and GIS analysis. Mr. Jeffery Peters of Questa Engineering will be the Principal Engineer in Charge and Carl Nelson will be the Project Engineer supported by Andrew McDade as the Engineering Associate. Geotechnical analyses will be directed by Willard Hopkins and supported by Chris Lyle, staff Geologist and Hydrologist.

SCHEDULE

The Draft Feasibility Study, with the North Harbor Drive Trail is to be completed by April 2016.

Emergency in the City of Fort Bragg

RESOLUTION NO. ____-2016

RESOLUTION OF THE FORT BRAGG CITY COUNCIL CONFIRMING THE CONTINUED EXISTENCE OF A LOCAL DROUGHT EMERGENCY IN THE CITY OF FORT BRAGG

WHEREAS, California Government Code section 8630 empowers the Fort Bragg City Council to proclaim the existence of a local emergency when the City is threatened or likely to be threatened by the conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property that are or are likely to be beyond the control of the services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of this City; and

WHEREAS, California Government Code section 8558(c) states that a “local emergency” means the duly proclaimed existence of conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the territorial limits of the City, including conditions caused by the drought; and

WHEREAS, on August 10, 2015, the Fort Bragg City Council adopted Resolution No. 3837-2015 declaring a Stage 1 Water Emergency and calling for immediate implementation of water conservation measures; and

WHEREAS, on September 30, 2015, the Fort Bragg City Council conducted an emergency meeting at which the City Manager reported that the City’s Noyo River diversion was not reliably providing water due to low flows and high salinity content, thus critically impairing the City’s ability to replenish water; and

WHEREAS, based on the aforementioned circumstances, the Fort Bragg City Council adopted Resolution No. 3856-2015, by which it declared a Stage 3 Water Emergency and instituted mandatory water conservation measures intended to reduce water use by 30% from the same period in the previous year as described in Title 14, Section 14.06 of the City of Fort Bragg Municipal Code; and

WHEREAS, at a regular meeting on October 13, 2015, the Fort Bragg City Council adopted Resolution No. 3857-2015, by which it reaffirmed Resolution No. 3856-2015 and its declaration of a Stage 3 Water Emergency; and

WHEREAS, at a regular meeting on October 13, 2015, the Fort Bragg City Council adopted Resolution No. 3858-2015, declaring a local drought emergency in the City of Fort Bragg; and

WHEREAS, at a regular meeting on November 9, 2015, the City Council of the City of Fort Bragg adopted Resolution No. 3865-2015, by which it continued the local drought emergency for an additional 30 days in accordance with California Government Code section 8630(c); and

WHEREAS, at a regular meeting on December 14, 2015, the City Council of the City of Fort Bragg adopted Resolution No. 3875-2015, by which it continued the local drought emergency for an additional 30 days in accordance with California Government Code section 8630(c); and

WHEREAS, at a regular meeting on December 14, 2015, the Fort Bragg City Council unanimously voted to reduce the Stage 3 Water Emergency to a Stage 1 Water Emergency; and

WHEREAS, at a regular meeting on January 11, 2016, the City Council of the City of Fort Bragg adopted Resolution No. 3883-2016, by which it continued the local drought emergency for an additional 30 days in accordance with California Government Code section 8630(c); and

WHEREAS, at a regular meeting on February 8, 2016, the City Council of the City of Fort Bragg adopted Resolution No. 3887-2016, by which it continued the local drought emergency for an additional 30 days in accordance with California Government Code section 8630(c); and

WHEREAS, at a regular meeting on March 14, 2016, the City Council of the City of Fort Bragg adopted Resolution No. 3890-2016, by which it continued the local drought emergency for an additional 30 days in accordance with California Government Code section 8630(c); and

WHEREAS, while the immediate threat to the Noyo River diversion has receded as a result of recent precipitation, the City of Fort Bragg's water system remains imperiled unless and until the Summers Lane Reservoir is constructed, filled, and capable of providing supplemental water during periods of extreme low flows in the Noyo River;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND PROCLAIMED by the City Council of the City of Fort Bragg that for reasons set forth herein, said local emergency shall be deemed to continue to exist until the City Council of the City of Fort Bragg, State of California, proclaims its termination; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Fort Bragg will review the need for continuing the local drought emergency at least once every 30 days until the City Council terminates the local drought emergency; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this resolution confirming the continued existence of a local drought emergency shall be forwarded to the Director of the Governor's Office of Emergency Services and the Governor of the State of California, as well as the Mendocino County Office of Emergency Services.

Ruffing reported on the recent City Dialogue forum and an upcoming Finance & Administration Committee agenda.

3. MATTERS FROM COUNCILMEMBERS

Mayor Turner reported on his recent meeting with the Mendocino Solid Waste Management Authority, Tsunami Awareness Week, open house at the Police Department's Emergency Operations Center, the Fire Board meeting, Beer Festival and Whale Run. He commended Sheila Semans, Executive Director of the Noyo Center for Marine Science, for receiving the Matt Coleman Environmental Service Award. The Mayor noted that planning is underway for a Coastal Trail celebration on June 4.

Vice Mayor Peters reported that the Mendocino Transit Authority board of directors hired a new general manager, Carla Meyer. He said Cedar Street speed bump issues will be discussed at the next Public Works and Facilities Committee meeting. Peters said a Cinco de Mayo celebration will be held on Saturday, May 7, at Bainbridge Park.

Councilmember Cimolino reported on the following meetings and events: Mendocino Opioid Safety Coalition, Coalition for Gang Awareness and Prevention, Soroptimist International Dream Girls Summer Leadership Institute, Latino community movie screening, "Don't Tell Anyone."

Councilmember Hammerstrom reported on his attendance at the Mendocino Museum Road Show at Cotton Auditorium last week.

4A. PUBLIC COMMENTS ON NON-AGENDA, CONSENT CALENDAR & CLOSED SESSION ITEMS (30 Minutes)

- Debra DeGraw, Vice Chair of the Fort Bragg Promotion Committee, thanked the Council for approving the downtown Wi-Fi. She said she recently gave downtown businesses instructions on how to update their listings on the promotional website, www.fortbragg.com.
- Judy Valadao suggested a work program for homeless people to get them working and involved in the community.
- Jay McMartin Rosenquist said the word "federal" should be capitalized in the June 7 voter pamphlet on Measure U and the City Council should ask the City Attorney to have the County make this and two other minor changes.
- Douglas Chouteau stated that sweeps of homeless in Redway and Eureka are driving more homeless people to Fort Bragg.
- Eric Dwyer said there are dangerous places for children and dogs on both the north and south areas of the Coastal Trail.

- George Reinhardt made comments on Juliette Bohn's alternative fuels presentation and said he wants Fort Bragg to become a leader in alternative fuels.

5. PUBLIC HEARING

6. CONDUCT OF BUSINESS

- 6A. [16-106](#)** Receive Council Ad Hoc Committee Report on Interviews with Lodging Owners; Receive Committee Recommendations Regarding Potential Ballot Measure to Increase Fort Bragg's Transient Occupancy Tax (Bed Tax) Rate and Modifications to the City's Marketing and Promotions Program; and Provide Direction to Staff

City Manager Ruffing summarized the agenda report and the Ad Hoc Committee's recommendations regarding the Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT) increase and the marketing and promotions efforts for the City of Fort Bragg. Committee Members Peters and Turner reported on their recent visits with members of the local lodging establishments, noting that the response to this increase was very good and the Committee recommends putting a measure to increase TOT on the ballot in November.

Mayor Turner recessed the meeting at 7:40 PM; the meeting was reconvened at 7:50 PM.

Public Comment on this item was received from:

- Ginabelle, a member of the Fort Bragg Promotion Committee (FBPC), asked the Council to consider postponing the decision to bring promotions back in-house at the City, as they would like to continue their efforts without interruption. She noted the website has undergone a remodel and views are up over 200%.
- Nancy Swithenbank, member of the Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors, expressed concern about the fiscal impact to the Chamber if this change in marketing and promotion oversight is made.
- Sheila Semans thanked the Council for including the Noyo Center for Marine Science as one of the recipients of the TOT increase, and noted that the Oceanarium is very strongly related to tourism.
- Johanna Jensen supports a two percent TOT increase, stating that the Noyo Center will be feeding the local economy by bringing people to the area.
- Jay McMartin Rosenquist thought the increase was one percent and wanted to know why two percent is being proposed.
- Mary Nordell, bed and breakfast owner, asked what would happen between July 2016 and June 2017 if the Chamber is no longer administering the FBPC.
- Jeanette Colombi, motel owner, said the fortbragg.com website is clear and easy to navigate. She recommended voting on a special tax instead of a general tax to direct funds toward the uses mentioned.
- Eric Dwyer recommends changes to the division of the revenues, lowering the amount for marketing and increasing the amount for athletic fields. He wants to keep the marketing with the Chamber instead of in house at the City. He would like to see money go to the Mayor's Fund for the emergency weather shelter.
- Katie Turner Carr spoke in favor of the recommendation to put this measure on the ballot, and for the addition of the Noyo Center and athletic fields to the list of those receiving a portion of the revenues from the tax increase.
- Ray Alarcon, board member of the Chamber of Commerce, advocates a special tax, stating that the community will be more strongly supportive of such a measure.

Discussion: The Councilmembers discussed this agenda item in two segments: (1) Whether or not to put the measure on the November ballot, and if so, whether the measure should be a general or specific tax increase and how the revenues should be spent; and (2) Whether or not to bring the promotions committee back in house at the City of Fort Bragg. The following was noted during further discussion of this item:

- It was agreed that a general tax was more likely to be passed than a specific tax.
- All Councilmembers supported putting this measure on the November ballot as a general tax increase along with a companion measure about how to spend the funds.
- The Council would like to receive public input on the specific purposes for which the tax revenues will be spent and the percentage allocated to each item.
- The Council wants marketing and promotions to remain with the FBPC at this time. They recommended this issue be revisited if the ballot measure passes, by holding a conversation with the community, staff, and Council regarding how to manage the marketing and promotion of Fort Bragg.

The City Council directed staff to prepare a general tax increase measure for the November 2016 ballot to raise Transient Occupancy Tax by two percent, with a companion non-binding advisory measure directing how the funds are to be spent, based on input from the public. The Council tabled further discussion on marketing and promotions until after the November election.

Mayor Turner recessed the meeting at 8:56 PM; the meeting was reconvened at 9:02 PM.

6B. [16-111](#)

Receive Report and Provide Direction to Staff Regarding Use of Electric Personal Assistive Mobility Devices on the Fort Bragg Coastal Trail

Public Works Director Varga gave his staff report to the Council, noting that the Coastal Conservancy's legal counsel stated that the Coastal Trail deed restriction prohibiting active recreational activities applies to Electric Personal Assistive Mobility Devices (EPAMDs), including Segways.

Discussion: In response to questions from Vice Mayor Peters about whether the City could be vulnerable to lawsuits if EPAMDs were allowed on the trail, City Manager Ruffing said any breach in the irrevocable offer to dedicate the trail could result in the Coastal Conservancy taking over the park.

Public Comment: Lynne Baumgartner, owner of North Coast Segway, said EPAMDs are green tech, with no noise or emissions. Her business plan proposes to partner with the Noyo Center to give history and environmental education tours, and she would like to operate her Segway tour business on the Coastal Trail. She demonstrated the use of an EPAMD to the Council.

A motion was made by Vice Mayor Peters, seconded by Councilmember Cimolino, to continue the meeting past 10:00 PM. The motion carried unanimously.

Continued Public Comment:

- Lucas Peters said he has ridden Segways on the Coastal Trail and had a 100 percent positive reaction from people on the trail. He spoke on the safety of these devices and urged the Council to allow Segways on the Coastal Trail.
- Eric Dwyer said it was a mistake to issue a business license knowing that EPAMDs are not allowed on the Coastal Trail. He recommended that the code be rewritten to keep up with modern standards.
- Brady Baumgartner said Segways would raise the stoke-meter of Fort Bragg, and the city should get groovy, get rocking, and ride on.

Discussion: Much discussion was held about the use of EPAMDs on the Coastal Trail. The final consensus was that since the Coastal Conservancy has told the City such use would violate deed restrictions, the Council cannot allow it. The Council will refer the issue of Segway tours on the streets and sidewalks of Fort Bragg to the Public Works and Facilities Committee for further review and recommendations.

This matter was referred to the Public Works and Facilities Committee.
